Outreach For Justice Team Report

Unusual is only one word to describe 2020, but it may not be the best one. Our Outreach for Justice Team was unable to meet. Since we were unable to attend Church in our normal ways this year, it was difficult for us to identify needs and collect for some of the agencies we usually support.

All food items that were dropped off, were taken either to the Unemployment Help Centre or Drouillard Place. Our usual back pack and school supply collection was more difficult but we did receive some items and they were taken to Drouillard Place. We asked if you were unable to donate items, financial donations be made to a charity of your choice. At Christmas, toys and gifts for young people were collected and delivered to Drouillard Place. We were unable to take items to the nursing homes, as they have very strict rules for any items delivered to their facilities.

The Team appreciates all the support our parishioners have given us over the years and we look forward to again be able to see everyone at Church very soon.

Knit-wits Report

Even with the pandemic, your Knit-Witts managed to make 1,138 items (Adults 629, Teens & Children 306 & Baby 203) to help some of the organizations we've helped in past years. We delivered items with zero contact, wearing masks & gloves, placed on clean tables keeping a very safe distance from staff & patients.

Unfortunately, we could only deliver to half of the places we normally reach out to such as Children's Aid, Drouillard Place, Eastwood School, Extendicare - Southwood Lakes, Extendicare - Tecumseh, Feel Better Friends, Home Instead, Manitoba Outreach for First Nations, Met Hospital, Schelegal Nursing Home and Windsor Youth Centre. The nursing homes were very happy to receive the lapgans & when we contacted Drouillard place they were completely out of hats, scarves, baby clothes... they were very happy to get items so they can help those in need. There is no timeline when we can gather together to get things back on track & keep everyone safe, we just have to wait & see how things go with this virus.

Chancel Guild Report

St Marks Chancel Guild is made up of 10 dedicated individuals who quietly work behind the scenes doing everything necessary to prepare for the many services held at St Marks by-the-Lake throughout the year. We not only set up for Sunday Services but also prepare for weddings, baptisms and funerals, decorate the church for special occasions, make Palm crosses and anything else that is required of us.

On a weekly basis we are responsible for ensuring that everything needed for a service is ordered and in place before the service begins. These duties include:

- Polishing and maintaining the Communion vessels and candle holders
- Lighting the perpetual candle
- Ensuring that the correct Liturgical colours are in place each week
- · Washing and ironing the linens
- Arranging the altar flowers
- Setting up the altar for Communion

Due to the Covid Pandemic, we have been unable to do most of the above duties, although there was a brief time when we were able to set up for a few services. A big Thank you to Father Rob for doing all of the Chancel duties that we have been unable to assist with during the last 9 months or so. We hope to be back to our usual Chancel routine before long.

Thanks as always to Bev Watson for preparing our schedule and to our wonderful and dedicated Chancel Guild members for their efforts and promises to return when it is safe to do so.

We really need to increase our numbers as we are down to 10 members. <u>Men and woman are welcome to become Chancel Guild members</u>. Any new members would be welcomed with open arms. Choir and Church Music Report

This year has reminded me more than ever about the healing power of music and the joy that it can bring our lives. I miss our choir and our larger church community and the valuable prayer that comes from worshipping and singing together. It is said that when you sing, you pray twice.

This past year has been a very different one for all of us. The art of making and performing music has presented challenges that I never could have imagined. But these challenges have afforded the opportunity to grow and look at things in a new light. It has also reaffirmed how important music is to our lives and worship.

Musically, we have adapted our in-person services with the safety of the church community in mind. When we have been closed, I have enjoyed the process of recording music from home. It has provided an opportunity to grow and refine my personal technique and skill. It was fun to share some of the musical talent in my family as we recorded Advent and Christmas music featuring my daughters. We are all adapting to technology. I am looking forward to hosting a virtual choir night where we can sing our favourite hymns 'together' in a different way.

On a personal note, I have truly appreciated the love and support of our parish this past year. This year has been filled with loss, grief and many professional challenges as we navigate home schooling three little ones and learn to teach in an entirely new way.

There is hope on the horizon. I truly believe that we will bounce back and have a more enthusiastic choir than ever. Sometimes it takes the absence of something before we realize how valuable it is to us. The choir has done a good job of staying connected to each other through email and song sharing and I look forward to the days when I can give them all the customary St. Mark's hug.

I look forward to resuming traditional worship and choir practice. When we do so, new members are always welcome and encouraged to join us! The only requirement is a desire to sing. No audition necessary. Our choir is composed of a mixture of trained voices with musical background and those who like to sing in a friendly group setting with some or no training. You do not need to know how to read music – the director will help with that!

We are very thankful for the music ministry of Amanda Dibbs and Joan Hartley, who generously give of their time and talent. I so appreciate their kindness and willingness to play for our congregation in my absence, at early services and other musical occasions. We love when Eric Mainwaring can join us with his beautiful trumpet sounds. Thank you also to Bev Watson and Christian Paulton for always going above and beyond as it relates to their roles in the choir. Thank you also to the wardens for their support and kindness.

I am so thankful to Jane and the Sunday school volunteers who help with my little ladies while I play and work with the choir. Trish's "corner" is invaluable, as is her patience! And thank you to the congregation for embracing their boisterous energy and the occasional 'extra' musical sounds! Thank you to Rob for leading us

with such grace and kindness and for his support of the music ministry. It is wonderful to work alongside such a caring minister. It is a pleasure to work with such an excellent staff and caring faith community.

We hope to continue to offer relevant worship music and infuse Sundays with new hymns and anthems and look forward to better times ahead.

Children's and Youth Ministry Report for 2020

Although 2020 has been met with many challenges, St. Marks was able to minister to parishioners and their



families in a variety of ways! Our youth continued to be active participants in parish life and it was wonderful to see them using their talents in many ways. In Dec. 2019, we eagerly welcomed 5 new youth choir members, whose voices added an angelic sweetness as we prepared for the seasons of Lent and Easter. We look forward to gathering again in song. We also welcomed new servers who were just starting their training.

For most of the year, the children and youth participated virtually, as they were sent a lesson weekly online. This included family activities, prayers and easy projects/crafts based on the Lectionary readings.

Some of the children met (masked and socially distanced) in the summer to act out readings, which were

filmed and included in the on-line services! They were wonderful actors and it was fun to further explore the stories of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob in a unique way!

For Pentecost, parishioners were encouraged to take pictures outside of the church, using various 'wind and fire' Holy Spirit symbols. Pictures were shared on our website.





We were excited to return to church in Sept. with all of the new safety protocols in place. Each child was given their own desk and supplies to use each week. They learned about the story of Moses in some creative ways!

They made a Burning Bush with silly string flames

(see Picture) and learned about the Exodus and parting of the Red Sea with a little help from cookies and icing!

The children were thrilled to see the beautiful wall posters, painted a few years ago by Joe Pastovich, depicting important events in the life of Moses. Joe, your



ministry lives on through your wonderful artwork! We had an average of 8-10 children attending each week and were so happy to finally be together!



The Tweens group (Gr.4-8) began meeting twice a month in the Hall after the 10:30am service and it was wonderful to see them continue to connect with one another and share in discussions.

Although we were unable to meet in person after the 2nd week of Advent, the children had created a special Advent candle to bring home, along with readings and prayers for the families.

Children and families have continued to communicate on-line with each other as well, which shows the importance of community relationships and how they help to provide positive support for one another. In a few years, when looking back on this unique global event, children may not remember particular lessons, but will remember the positive impact of belonging to a caring Christian community and hopefully how it helped them through the pandemic.

We were unable to meet in May for the annual trek to London. We missed the grand Sunday night service, the Monday night banquet, the interactions with familiar faces, and the general feeling of 'togetherness' during presentations.

What we got was a virtual meeting condensed to a few hours on a very pleasant September Saturday. We still had 71 pages of pre-reading in the reports section of our materials, but we didn't spend much time discussing them. Our attention was sharp and focussed on our new Bishop's vision for Huron.

As reported in the Popular Report written by Rev. Dr. Justin Comber:

"The day's offerings were carefully organized to define where we stand now, and to plot a way forward."

The people that usually leave the room for the Financial Report barely had time to get a coffee. It was over in under 7 minutes! (And in the familiar voice of Bp. Terry "all God's people said ... Amen")

Rector's Report

It never occurred to me that I might experience a year like this in ministry. Believe it or not, there was no course for pandemic ministry when I was in seminary. It has been trying, difficult, and exhausting. Back in the spring my colleagues and I all suggested it felt like when you first started out in ministry and didn't know what or how to do things yet and had to figure everything out. None of the usual stuff was applicable and we had to learn a new way of doing everything. On top of that the kids were home and childcare was not available. It could have taken a very heavy toll except for one very important thing, the St. Mark's family. You were patient and understanding when things went awry, you were realistic in your expectations, and you were supportive not just of church life but our family life. Trish, the kids, and I are deeply grateful for your kindness through this whole experience and we have seen the fruit of God's work and your faithfulness in the way that you have responded to everything that the past year threw at us. We thank God for our parish family and for all of God's goodness in carrying us through this experience.

Having thanked our gracious God, it is important to thank others too. Firstly, the wardens have been supportive, attentive, they have shared their wisdom, and they have offered good counsel to ensure that St. Mark's could faithfully and responsibly minister to the needs of the world through the pandemic. On top of that, none of them are cutting and running the opposite direction even though it has been a difficult year to be a warden. I thank them for their ministry and care.

As usual, the Rev'd Jack Dressler and Eileen continue to be part of our parish family. Early last year, pre-pandemic, Jack covered services while I was away and then on several occasions since he was lined up to cover and then new measures related to gathering prevented that. Jack's willingness to be available under less than ideal conditions shows his faithfulness to God and his commitment to St. Mark's. I thank Jack and Eileen for always being there and always being supportive.

Even though it has been many years since Canon Geoff Dibbs moved permanently to Arizona, he remains interested and engaged in life at St. Mark's. He participates in our online services, he sends messages keeping in touch and offering support from a distance, and I am certain that he prays. I thank him for his ongoing interest and support.

Our staff have adapted, adjusted, improvised, waited patiently, and done things in new ways to ensure we could keep going and keep active in our ministry. Christie has kept everyone connected and been flexible with her time to accommodate recording and uploading schedules, Andrea has kept the music we appreciate so much flowing recording from home and church for online services and playing in person at services at the church, and Jane has found new ways to keep the kids of the parish engaged in their lives of faith, sending electronic packages when we weren't gathering in person, and setting up a brand new Sunday school area in the hall when we were gathering. I thank all of them for their faithfulness and commitment to their ministry on our behalf.

Mark Charlton has been even busier than usual because of extra reporting requirements relating to the CEWS and CERB. He has carefully helped us navigate the sporadic financial challenges we've faced and kept us on track with his usual cheerful and faithful manner. On top of that he regularly asks if he can help and tells me that I need to take a break. He is a hardworking and committed leader in our parish. I thank him for sharing his financial acumen and for sharing his care and love for St. Mark's.

One of the things that has amazed me is that so much of our common life has continued. 8 o'clockers stay in touch with each other, knit wits keeping doing their thing, pastoral care ministry moved to phone visiting, outreach stuff has happened, we even managed to have meetings of the Parish Council, Deanery Council, and Diocesan Synod. St. Mark's, in spite of the restrictions, has managed to remain active and engaged in the life of the church and the world. I thank all of our coordinators, volunteers, and parishioners

for supporting us and staying faithful and connected through one of the weirdest years in the entire history of this parish.

St. Mark's survived 2020. That is some good news that we can pull out of the past year. It has been a year of fear, concern, and worry. We have been locked down, quarantined, inconvenienced, and exasperated. We have lost time, opportunities, and even loved ones. We have been threatened by disease, despair, and deprivation. Still, St. Mark's survived and for that we must offer deep and humble thanks to God. God working through generations of generous parishioners, through word and sacrament, and through the power of the Holy Spirit has enabled the life of our community to continue and our ministry to continue to give life to our parish family, our community, and our world. God is good and God kept us going through all of the experiences of 2020.

That should give us some confidence to look ahead. The challenge in looking ahead is the incredible amount of uncertainty. Normally when I write a vestry report I spend more time looking ahead and casting a vision for the next year of our parish life than I do looking back at what happened in the previous year. That is a deeply challenging exercise because there's no telling how long the pandemic will go on or how long we will be dealing with stay at home orders and lock downs and all the rest. I can't be certain about when we are going to be back in church or back to doing fundraisers or back to bible study and Knit Wits and coffee hour. The one thing that we can be certain of is God and God's goodness, love, mercy, and grace. We can be certain that as we face uncertainty ahead in 2021 we face that with God's help.

So, as far as a vision for the next year of our parish life, we are going to keep it simple and just live faithfully under the circumstances. We are going to pray by ourselves and together. We are going to spend time talking to God and listening to God. We are going to get up in the morning and pray or just before we lay down to sleep we are going to pray, or both. We are going to pray for ourselves, our families, our neighbours, our community, our country and the world. We will pray for people in need, people in distress, and people in harm's way because of their work. For right now, since we are not going anywhere or doing anything else we are going to get together in prayer every Sunday and Wednesday morning with the help of our parish video service offering. When it's possible and safe we'll go back to gathering in person at the church and we'll pray together there too. Prayer is a rich and powerful way for us to live faithfully and be of service to the world. God is good and will hear our prayers and bless us and those for whom we pray.

We are going to be kind and patient with ourselves and others. We are going to take it easy on ourselves and seek to remain healthy and not be too demanding on ourselves in terms of goals and striving after achievement in adverse circumstances. With others, we are going to resist the temptation to blame, point fingers, and shame people. We are going to be patient with those that are struggling to be patient. We are going to be kind to those that are struggling to be kind. We are going to be loving to those who are struggling to be loving. We are going to offer to others what they lack without judgement and without condemnation because the situation we are living in is so unbelievably hard and it affects everyone differently. On top of that, we are going to reach out. We are going to get on the phone, get on the internet, get on Zoom, Facebook or whatever other system and we are going to talk and listen, and share life with family and friends and fellow parishioners. We are going to cut through the isolation as best as we can under the circumstances. God has filled us with all the love, patience, generosity, and kindness of heaven through the working of the Holy Spirit, so we have a great deal to share with the people around us.

We are going to be generous. We are going to be generous with our time, not just because we have a lot of it free at the moment, but because we all need time together. We are going to spend time with others in whatever ways are reasonable and safe. If that means a few more phone calls to family and others, great; if that means a few more snuggles with your kids on the couch, great; if that means a few more notes in the mail, great; if that means a few more minutes at the table over good food and drink with the folks you love; great, if that means a few more words spoken in support of the cashier or the cart guy at the grocery store, the nurse or doctor or PSW or secretary at the clinic, great. These are ways to live generously. We are also

going to be generous with our resources, not just because we are saving money by not going out to eat, but because there are folks in need all around us. As a church family we gave more in outreach last year than in any other year I've been here because the need was so great. We did that together and we will again, but we are also going to be generous individually, we are going to share of all of our resources so that people can be relieved, helped, healed, and allowed to live a dignified and abundant life. God has been incredibly generous with us offering us all we need and more to live and share life with others so that they can live too.

We are going to work towards a just society. We are going to support measures from government and other organizations and the church to ensure that everyone has the same opportunities to live and enjoy the blessings of God. The pandemic has exposed gross inequalities in that the elderly people, Black people, Indigenous People, People of Colour, and economically disadvantaged people have borne the greatest consequences through this time. To live faithfully we need to take care of those who need care because Jesus is in every one of them. To neglect them is to neglect the same Lord that saved us through the cross and resurrection and who has been with us caring for us through the pandemic. We need to support changes to long term care, anti-racism measures, and initiatives like a Universal Basic Income, and pharma care. We also need to engage individually, on a basic human level, with people who have experienced inequality. We can stay in touch with seniors, we can chat with neighbours from different backgrounds, and learn their names, and develop relationships with them, we can show respect to every human being we meet. We cannot turn a blind eye to the plight of our brothers and sisters because God has not turned a blind eye to our plight, but has loved us and watched over us through our whole life. God works through the people of God to do that, which means that God works through us to love and watch over those who are most vulnerable to difficulties and indignities in our world.

Right now our world does not look much like the Kingdom of God that we pray for everyday when we pray the Lord's Prayer. It is not as peaceful, joyful, or hopeful as that, but it can be. God is working and helping and blessing and calling us to join with that and be a blessing. That is what the parish family of St. Mark's can be in 2021, a blessing to the world in prayer, kindness, generosity, and justice. All of that is possible even from our homes. All of that is possible because we have God's help. For 2021, let's keep it simple and live faithfully and in that be a blessing to the world.

To Christie for diligently posting donations to PowerChurch software (we'll be sure to get tax receipts out as soon as possible in February); to Carolynne for the many counting sessions (which are also great opportunities for me to share what's on my mind); to other counters, who jumped in whenever available; to the Durlings for stepping up as first time financial 'checkers'; to Sally for tolerating my moods and the files, invoices, and papers all over the dining and living rooms; and finally to YOU for your very generous gifts throughout the year.

2020 Sterling Seven

Seven things you want to know about the MONEY, even if you don't care to read financial statements:

- 1. Awesome Offerings the 'call' went out that fall fundraising wasn't going to happen; the 'answer' came LOUDLY as we saw a \$10,000 surge in the last two weeks of the year.
- 2. Late Capital donations several sizeable donations arrived in December (most as memorials).
- 3. CEWS news the federal wage subsidy flowed through the Diocese with a \$12,000 payroll credit in June; there's more coming but we will record it in 2021 when it gets here!
- 4. Covid cutbacks no fundraising, no dinner church, no services, no meetings, no travel; cost were down in many areas.
- 5. Property Projects limited sprucing up tasks; but we needed new phones, video equipment, and a designated substance survey.
- 6. Needs of Others recognizing the generosity of the congregation, we couldn't just keep it for ourselves; extra funds sent to Unemployed Help Centre and PWRDF Huron.
- 7. Reserved Revenues okay, we didn't send everything away; designated donations were 'squirrelled' away for KnitWits & Capital, there were still funds left for Youth & more Capital.

Many of you look forward to some lovely graphs at this point. Sorry ... No Pie Charts for you!

Take a moment and remember the smell of turkey, BBQ steak, Ribs (after golf), meat pies, roast pig, pancakes, soup, coffee, and bazaar chili. Better than the smell of \$25,000 that we are missing in 2020. I missed seeing you.

Still, we finish the year with available operating cash of \$7,171.

2021 Budget

Can we get back to 'new normal' over the summer?

Offerings will be down because we shouldn't count on memorial donations and hope a PAC appeal is not needed.

Fall PAC events normally generate \$15,000. Let's plan for \$10,000

Releasing \$5,000 Capital reserve funds to pay down (and with the help of more parishioners, pay off) the WFCU mortgage in March. Also, hoping to use reserves to fund more dinner church events.

Salaries are not changing. Insurance is doubling! Loan payments drastically reduced with refinancing.

If all goes to plan (and it won't) we will improve our bank balance by \$3 in 2021.

1) Accounting policies

- Capital assets represent historical costs of buildings, major renovations, furniture and equipment. Values are not amortized to operations.
- During the year voluntary services were provided. These services are not normally purchased by the Church. Because of the difficulty in determining their fair value, donated services are not recognized in these statements
- 2) Parishioner loans are due in 2021. Interest accrues at 4%.
- Building loan repayments are \$19,700 (\$19,700 in 2018) annually at the current interest rate of 4.75%.

The Church and Hall are pledged as security.

The original loan was for \$600,000 in 2010 for an initial term of 5 years.

A one year renewal was accepted in March 2015.

A five year renewal was accepted in March 2016.

Financial Review for the year ending, December 31, 2020

A review of the financial records and Financial Statements of St. Mark's Church, for the year ending December 31, 2020, was conducted. Samplings, comparisons, reconciliations and explanations formed our review.

Note: We realize that the Covid 19 pandemic has had an impact on the various income and expense items for 2020.

With the information and financial records, we performed the following reviews:

1. OFFERINGS:

We sampled the week of February 16th, 2020, looking at the recording of offerings, flower donations, capital donations and loose collections. We observed that they were properly recorded on an Excel spread sheet and easily traced to the Bank deposit slip and to the Bank Statement. We also were able to back check the total deposit to specific items on the offering-by-envelope list.

2. BANK RECONCILIATION:

We reviewed the year-end bank reconciliation that was provided. We determined that all outstanding deposits and outstanding cheques were accounted for.

3. OUTREACH:

We followed the Outreach activities from the Account Activity Statement to the Income & Expense Statement. In addition we were able to follow Outreach amounts at year-end to Accounts Payable.

We also did a comparison of current expense items to their prior year amounts:

- Payroll, performed by a third party Diocese
- Apportionment, which is calculated by the Diocese based on prior expense disbursements.
- Plus a number of other expenses, which were presumed to have decreased due to the pandemic and limited activities at the Church, during 2020. i.e. youth ministry, music supplies and ministry/other.

Our overall review of the various activity accounts to the financial statements (I & E & Balance Sheet), has resulted in our satisfaction that proper record keeping at St. Mark's has led to the continual financial health of our Church.
