# **RECTOR'S LETTER**

My Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I find myself in an unusual situation as I write this letter. I find myself over halfway through Advent, over halfway to Christmas and I am oddly ill-prepared. Normally, by this point I have some sort of thought or direction about what I will be preaching on Christmas Eve. Normally, I have the majority of Christmas gifts purchased and I might even have some wrapped. Normally, I would have been listening to Christmas music and would be beginning to really enjoy the season of Advent and the preparations for Christmas. This year, though, I find that the first two weeks have slipped by and none of what I normally would have done

is done. Now, it is not that I have been sitting in a Lazy Boy, eating bon-bons, and binge watching Netflix. I've been busy with visiting parishioners in hospital and other institutions, I've been attending meetings, ordinations, and funerals, and I've been doing the work necessary to get ready for our Sunday worship and other church activities. I have been busy with what is, honestly really important stuff. In the first two weeks of Advent I have not found the time to listen to the call of John the Baptist and to really prepare the way of the Lord in my life.

Believe it or not, that is not far off from the experience of the first Christmas. Two thousand years ago people were really busy dealing with the Romans, living by the law and observing all of its tenets, and doing what needed to be done to put food on the table and keep a roof over their families' heads. People in the first century were really busy with what is, honestly, really important stuff. The only people that knew anything was going on, that God was coming into the world in the flesh, were Mary and Joseph and Mary's cousin Elizabeth and that's only because they had left some space in life for God to tell them. Nobody else was preparing the way, and because of that there was no fanfare, no excitement, and no fireworks when Jesus was born. Only a few shepherds who happened to have some spare time on their hands in the middle of the night heard that something was going on from the angel choir and wandered over to Bethlehem to see what was up. Basically, this incredible thing, the coming of God into the world and into human life, slipped past everyone without notice.

That is still a risk in the 21st century. The coming of God into the world and into human life can easily slip right past us while we're doing what is, honestly, really important stuff. Fortunately, this is not a new or novel problem. The roots of this problem are ancient and so, over two thousand years, the church in her wisdom has developed ways to help us back on track, to help us prepare the way of the Lord, to help us take notice of this incredible thing that is happening with God coming into the world and into our lives. Beginning on the 17th of December, the church invites us into seven days of disciplined devotional preparation, a time of daily prayer. In this time the church gives us a way to focus our prayers on the coming of Christ. The hymn *O Come, O Come Emanuel,* is a compilation of the seven "O Antiphons". One of the "O Antiphons" is used each day in daily prayers through the last seven days of Advent, allowing us to focus and prepare the way of Lord by calling Christ to enter our lives bringing us the blessings and joys of the kingdom of God. To help us with this a small pamphlet will be shared on Sunday with a very short devotional that you can use each day as you prepare to celebrate Christmas. Please join me through the last few days of Advent in preparing the way of the Lord in our lives through prayer and devotion. Please join me in making room for something that is honestly, really important, calling Christ to enter our lives. Please join with me in really getting ready for Christmas and not just being busy. I wish you and your loved ones every Christmas blessing.


## **Building**
